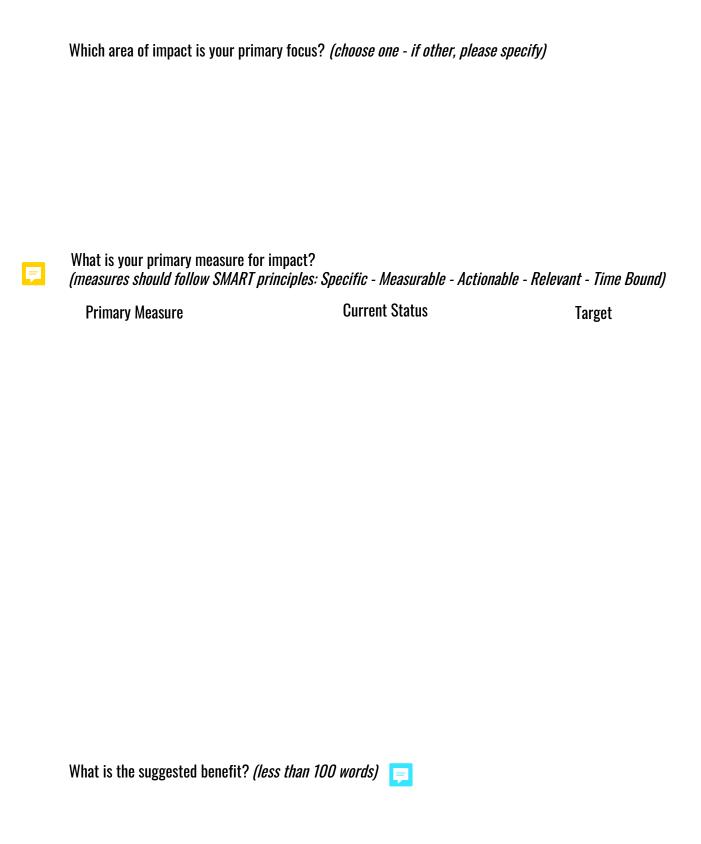



Specialized Foster Homes

Specialized foster homes for children in foster care at risk of trafficking or exhibiting targeted behaviors.



Targeted Behaviors

- Sexual activity with adults
- Online sexual relationships
- Sharing explicit photos/videos
- Substance abuse disorder
- Runaway children
- Foreign national children



Training

Foster parents must complete 9 hours of specialized training focused on caring for children exhibiting targeted behaviors or those who have been trafficked.

This training is developed and updated by the Trafficking Prevention Unit to ensure its relevance and appropriateness.



In-Home Services

Foster parents and child will receive up to 10 hours of tailored coaching, and in-home services, weekly for 90 days when accepting a child with targeted behaviors. The contractor also offers 24-hour crisis support.



Placement Stability

Placement stability for children in foster care will improve and run behavior will decrease by developing homes with personal connections to these children. Providing training, coaching, and support to foster homes in the first 90 days is particularly effective.

New Placement

Children placed in inadequate homes or facilities often leave due to unmet complex needs. Child leaves placement.

Child Enters Run Status

Child is reported as missing to the police and the search begins to recover the child.

Placement Disruption Cycle

Child is Located

Child cannot return to previous placements, emergency shelters lack beds for them, and no emergency residential options meet their needs, leaving the child without a stable and supportive placement.

Child is Victimized

Children are at high risk of assault and trafficking due to vulnerabilities and homelessness, often falling victim to traffickers.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

PROBLEM

Children in foster care are disproportionately impacted by human trafficking; traffickers prey on vulnerable and marginalized populations. Half of all human trafficking victims experience re-victimization. This highlights the need for a more robust prevention and support system for these children. **Research indicates that caregivers are the most impactful in terms of protecting children from human trafficking.** Missouri does not currently have dedicated, trauma-informed, foster homes for children who have been recovered from human trafficking. Current placement options are not designed to address the intense and immediate needs of these children.

There is a critical gap in early stabilization and support, which limits our ability to stop the cycle of running and exploitation; this can worsen outcomes for these children and increases their risk for further victimization.

PROPOSED SOLUTION

Develop a specialized foster home program that encompasses human trafficking training and intensive in-home supports for families caring for children with a history of human trafficking. Foster parents will be equipped with training and knowledge of prevention, trauma, and risks of re-victimization.

Specialized foster homes will be supported with intensive in-home services specific to human trafficking and child sexual exploitation.



BENEFITS

Specialized foster homes for trafficking victims represents a critical effort to address the unique vulnerabilities of children in the child welfare system and support their recovery.

- Supporting trafficked children is challenging due to the lack of community-based services
- The R.E.S.E.T. program equips foster homes with tools to aid these children while they await services
- Intensive support efforts aim to reduce re-victimization and improve outcomes for trafficked children
- There is a call from federal lawmakers for a comprehensive systems-level approach to human trafficking
- Missouri will be the first state, in our region, to develop this type of program, which will make Missouri a leader in its work to combat trafficking and break the cycle of victimization

RETURN ON INVESTMENT

In 2024, 30 Missouri children, with an indicator for human trafficking, were placed in hospitals as there were no available, less restrictive placements, that could meet their needs. These hospital placements cost the state approximately \$1.5 million dollars. If these same children could have been placed in a foster home that specializes in human trafficking, **the state could have saved \$552,264.00**.

ZOOM INTO TRAFFICKING

From November 2024 to April 2025, the Children's Division received 184 reports alleging human trafficking.

25%

of these reports involved children already in CD custody.



At risk children in foster care run more frequently due to placement instability, which increases their risk of being trafficked.



Older children are placed in restrictive or temporary placements due to a lack of homes to meet their needs.

60%

of children currently missing from foster care have run from care at least one time prior.

TARGETED REGION

The R.E.S.E.T. Program will be piloted before statewide implementation. The St. Louis Region provides an opportunity for this pilot. From November 2024 to April 2025:

children from St. Louis had been placed on run status at least one time.

NEARLY 50%

of those children were placed in residential facilities, hospitals, or Juvenile Detention facilities upon recovery.

reports were received alleging sex trafficking of children already in foster care.
